

The March session of "Sunday on Saturday" had a surprise visit from father and son, Greg and Rory. They joined us for about one hour. The session began with prayer. All of us sat in a



circle and placed some sacred items into the "Lenten Burial Box". A fancy candle, colorful flowers, the Alleulia, the Gloria, and the words of turning away from temptation were put in this box until Easter Sunday. We read a Bible story then decorated plain crosses using different shapes and Christian stickers. The class continued for the three Berry students as we explored the downfall of one king after another after the death of King David. They also began a new craft project.

As we came closer to Easter Sunday, several faithful helpers filled plastic eggs with special treats for the Easter Egg Hunt as well as creating Easter baskets for the children of the parish. This year, our new seminarian, Emily Given, provided us with new "Bunny Baskets" for the children. Craft items and new stuffed animals were included in each one. The morning of the Egg Hunt found the children and their parents gathered in the library to hear an Easter story and to open the Lenten Box. Firstly, many thanks to those who have been enjoying the music for the past few months, and to the choir for their hard work! While the choir is on a well-earned break for the summer, we will be pausing chanted psalms until their return in the fall.

This summer, we will be introducing a new (but old!) practice: Metrical Psalms. Following the Protestant Reformation in the early 16th century, many reformers throughout Europe translated the Book of Psalms into the vernacular for use by their congregations, in meter. Meter refers to the number of syllables in each line, just as it does in poetry. Metrical translations of Psalms allowed for congregations to more easily sing them to music, many tunes of which still survive in our hymnal today. Examples of this include the tunes for "Comfort, Comfort Ye, My People," "A Mighty Fortress," and "The People Who in Darkness Walked," amongst others. Metrical Psalters were often printed without music, allowing the musicians of a parish to select ones to fit. Eventually, these metrical psalm translations gave way to less-direct paraphrased texts, and poetry inspired by (but not literal translations of) scripture—many of which are still found in today's hymnal!

It is my hope that throughout the summer, you will enjoy engaging with the Psalms in a different way, utilizing another branch of our musical tradition!
